2011: The Year in Review and a Look Ahead

ROADS AND TRANSPORTATION: BETTER WAYS TO GET AROUND TOWN

- In October, construction and improvements of Old Morgantown Road were completed.
- The planning study is complete for the Smallhouse Road/Cave Mill Road Realignment Project.
- Snow and ice removal was performed for 10 snow events this year, keeping roads clear. We received 21 inches of snowfall, more than doubling the annual average of 9 inches.
- The Bluegrass Farms Realignment Project was completed, allowing for improved traffic flow.
- Design for multiple road, sidewalk, storm water, and traffic signal projects was completed, with work to begin in FY2012.

STRONG NEIGHBORHOODS: IMPROVING INFRASTRUCTURE, EMPOWERING PEOPLE

• The former Housing and Community Development Department has been streamlined and re-named Neighborhood and Community Services to better serve our residents.



- Neighborhood and Community Services has added an international liaison position.
- Property was purchased on Covington Street in order to relieve long standing stormwater issues in the neighborhood.
- 30 homeowners received financial assistance with energy efficiency improvements.
- A drainage basin and intake structure was reconstructed on Smallhouse Road to assist with stormwater runoff.





DOWNTOWN REDEVELOPMENT/RIVERFRONT

- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds were used to complete necessary stormwater improvements in the downtown area.
- Sidewalks were replaced on two blocks of Main Avenue between Clay Street and Gordon Avenue.



 New storm sewer pipes were installed, and sidewalk, curb and gutters were replaced on State Street.

PUBLIC SAFETY: MORE STAFF, BETTER EQUIPMENT

• The BGPD Firing Range facility was renovated to provide a better and more comprehensive training environment for law enforcement.



- A new rescue fire engine and a new aerial tower truck were purchased and put into service.
- The Alternate 911 Center was tested and is now operational in the event that the main Communications Center is unavailable.

- The BGFD hired 7 new recruits.
- The BGPD hired 17 new recruits.
- Public safety vehicles are now outfitted with additional equipment for better connectivity.



- After receiving training from the U.S. Secret Service, BGPD now has its own in-house digital forensics technicians.
- The BGFD received an Assistance to Firefighters Grant to upgrade portable mobile radios.
- Images of floor plans were added to the Fire Department wireless applications in order to assist firefighters en-route to a scene.
- Building renovations at the Airport Fire Station were completed.

















- Aerial pictometry photography was completed to facilitate improvements in the 911 Center's GIS mapping capabilities.
- BGPD standardized an internal investigation format to provide consistency and to assist all personnel involved in internal investigations.

PARKS AND RECREATION: NEW AND IMPROVED FACILITIES

• Lighting at the Hobson Grove baseball fields was replaced.



- Electrical upgrades were completed in-house at both Circus Square Park and the historic Riverview at Hobson Grove.
- An old basketball court was completely replaced at Covington Woods Park.
- A newly built picnic shelter at Covington Woods Park received an Operation P.R.I.D.E. Award.



 Parks and Recreation Department/Special Olympics received more than \$40,000 in material and cash donations.


- Participation at parks facilities was up 1% to 1,146,106 visits.
- Revenue at parks facilities was up 0.8% to \$2,476,590.
- The Kereiakes Park East Little League picnic shelter was built with contributions from the league.



WAYS WE'RE SAVING MONEY

- The City is currently transitioning toward 100% electronic payments with all utilities, which will save time and money.
- Procedures for wage tax filers were revised, alleviating almost \$5,000 in costs for forms, mailing, postage, and internal printing.
- Workers' compensation and vehicle insurance policies were reviewed, which resulted in a savings of over \$25,000.
- New deductibles chosen with regard to risk management are projected to save the City \$70,000 per year.
- The vacant house at Kereiakes Park is being rented out to a local company.





- Almost \$1 million was saved through various in-house study, design, survey and project management efforts of the Public Works Department.
- The Fire Department and Human Resources Department cooperated on a grant to fund firefighter medical stress tests, saving over \$5,000 in local tax dollars.

BETTER WAYS OF WORKING

• The City launched its Facebook page in December 2010 and currently reaches out to over 700 friends.

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• The City website was redesigned, including the design of web based applications, to better serve the public.



• The Board of Commissioners now has laptops that allow them to receive information such as agenda packets and email, saving time and money.

April 2012

- An agreement was developed with BGMU allowing them to access our wireless net work for a fee.
- Employees received new desktop computers which included an upgrade to Windows 7 and Office 2010.



- At the Sloan Convention Center, all carpeting, 1,800 chairs and 42 tables were replaced, along with overhead door drapes and motorized tracks, air walls in the ballroom and meeting rooms, and a 75-ton HVAC chiller.
- The BGPD evidence vault was audited and reorganized to provide a more manageable and efficient filing and retrieval system.
- Energy efficiency improvements were completed at 22 City-owned buildings, and 2,165 LED light bulbs were purchased and installed.



• The City License Division collected over \$355,000 in additional occupational license fee revenues through field inspections and audits of new and transient businesses.





BETTER SECURITY

- A new anti-virus software and policy enforcement tool has been implemented as a part of the City-wide desktop replacement.
- Information Technology installed numerous additional cameras at various City facilities in order to enhance security.



- Additional encryption was added to our Police Department Mobile Data Computers for added security.
- A study was completed by an employee Process Action Team and recommendations have been made for added security and access control for City facilities. Several improvements are scheduled to be completed in FY2012.

BETTER PRICE TAG

- Based on current usage, a major software license agreement was re-worked to save the City money.
- A contract was developed with a new outsourced mailing service for occupational tax returns, resulting in reduced mailing costs.

• An agreement renewal was negotiated for on-line training, increasing our number of users while decreasing our costs for up to five years.



- The City worked with FEMA to recoup \$104,000 in flood damages from the May 2010 floods.
- \$79,000 in City property losses were recovered through personal payments or court-ordered restitution.

DISTINCTIVE

- For the fourth year in a row, the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting has been awarded to the City by the Government Finance Officers Association.
- The City hosted the fourth Student Solutions Program, allowing high school students to become involved and engaged in City government.
- The City was re-certified as a "Drug Free Workplace" through the Department of Workers' Compensation Claims, which resulted in a 5% workers' compensation premium savings.







- The Neighborhood and Community Services Department donated over \$10,000 worth of salvage materials to Habitat for Humanity.
- Bowling Green received an Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating of 3 for both residential and commercial properties, which places us in the top 3% in the nation.
- The BGPD assembled and launched its own band called the *Crime Rockers*, allowing police officers to use their rock and roll talent to communicate safety and anti-crime messages to local school children.



OUTSTANDING

- Bowling Green received \$5,000 in the Drive to a Million Campaign, placing 2nd in the "Innovation and Creativity" category for originality in public education and awareness.
- The American Planning Association (APA) named Fountain Square Park as *One of 10 Great Public Spaces for 2010* under the organization's Great Places in America Program.

• The BGFD submitted its annual compliance report for accreditation with the Center for Public Safety Excellence. This is the third year of being accredited.



- For the first time since 1996, there were no preventable employee lost-time injuries in FY2011.
- BGPD assisted the Federal Bureau of Investigations in the case involving two suspected foreign national terrorists arrested in May of 2011.
- The BGFD Investigations Unit solved 48% of their cases, more than twice the national average of 18%.

HIGH PERFORMING

- The Public Works Department successfully completed its re-accreditation through the American Public Works Association.
 The department is the first and only accredited public works agency in Kentucky.
- The Public Information Division now produces, films and edits all *Spotlight on Bowling Green* programs in-house.













Bowling Green Fire Headquarters

- The third annual Internal Control and Fraud Awareness training was conducted for all City funded agencies and various City staff.
- The Housing Division of Neighborhood and Community Services received the High Performer Status from Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the 7th consecutive year.



- The BGFD Fire Investigations Unit continues to work jointly with the Bureau of Arson Task Force.
- Following an alert by Homeland Security regarding a suspicious aircraft expected to refuel at Bowling Green Warren County Regional Airport, BGPD located 32 kilos of cocaine and arrested the pilot and passenger, both Mexican nationals. Nearly \$1 million in cocaine (estimated street value) was seized.

FISCAL YEAR 2012 KEY BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

• The overall City operating budget increased by less than 1% for FY2012, compared to last year's adopted budget. The General Fund expenditure budget increased by just over \$4.6 million compared to the previous year. From the high mark of FY2008, the General Fund budget has been reduced by over \$4.7 million, or 8.3%.

- No local tax increases were recommended or adopted in the budget.
- The General Fund minimum reserve balance (savings) has been increased from 15% to 20% of revenues, to better underwrite the City's financial obligations.
- The City's largest capital road improvement project, Old Morgantown Road, completed in October, and a new capital road project, Smallhouse/ Cave Mill Road realignment, is identified as the next long-range transportation improvement goal.



- No new General Fund financed projects are proposed in FY2012. The total adopted Capital Improvement Program, including debt, is approximately \$18.3 million.
- \$950,000 in State funds will be used to maintain streets and sidewalks as part of the City's annual overlay and reconstruction program.





- \$1 million in local tax revenues will be used to continue the Stormwater Mitigation Program and to reactivate the Sidewalk Improvement Program for the enrichment of our community livability.
- \$174,000 will be spent on public safety capital improvement projects to replace equipment for the BGFD and enhance evidence control and criminal investigations in the BGPD, including the development of a stand-alone digital forensic lab
- Over \$1.4 million will be invested in the City's parks and recreation program for equipment replacement and facilities enhancements, including \$225,900 of federal funds for improvements to Parker-Bennett Community Center and Pedigo Park ball field.
- Approximately \$275,000 will be invested in capital improvement projects at the Sloan Convention Center.
