

STRONG NEIGHBORHOODS: IMPROVING INFRASTRUCTURE, EMPOWERING PEOPLE

- Neighborhood Services and International Communities Liaison merged to create a brand new division renamed: Community Engagement: For Neighbors and New Americans.
- Led the largest single-day community event in Downtown BGKY: Harvest Festival had an estimated attendance of 20,000+.
- Largest Academy for New Americans graduating class, with 30 graduates representing 13 countries and collectively speaking 21 languages.
- Largest attendance for the Reception for New Americans event, with 140 newly naturalized U.S. Citizens recognized at the eighth annual event.
- Revamped neighborhood grant to streamline application and selection criteria, renamed Strategic Neighborhood Grant funds, with a new funding cycle available July 1, 2025.

- FY25 had a record-setting number of cases and inspections for Code Compliance, surpassing 10,000 code cases for the first time.
- 98% Voluntary code compliance
- Code Officials and City staff conducted rapid damage assessments of almost 200 structures in 3 days following a major flooding disaster in the City during FY25, providing essential information to state and federal agencies on over \$6M in estimated losses.
- Animal Protection continued the free rabies vaccination and microchip program, hosting twice-annual free community clinics during FY25, vaccinating 23 pets and microchipping 285 animals.
- With the support of community partners, Animal Protection staff built and distributed 47 doghouses during Operation P.A.W.S., providing them for dogs that were living without adequate shelter.



- FY25 was a record year for affordable housing, with the announcement of 635 new tax-credit units coming to Warren County.
- 24 Grants awarded totaling \$20,172,000
- 19 Grant applications submitted and 49 grants managed across City departments

- Phase I of the West End Greenway was completed resulting in approximately 3,000 feet of multi-use paths on Veterans Memorial Boulevard and Gordon Avenue.
- The City was awarded CDBG-DR funds for Live the Dream to build six affordable rental units and Habitat for Humanity constructing four single-family homeownership units.
- \$3.85M of CDBG-DR funds were awarded to replace an aging storm sewer underneath Chestnut Street, mitigating flooding in the surrounding neighborhood.
- The Housing Division successfully provided housing assistance to 897 low-income, elderly and disabled families, ensuring permanent housing and significantly improving quality of life for thousands in our community.
- The Housing Division provided housing assistance to 31 homeless veterans, who are also receiving supportive services through the VA. In FY25, added 12 new veterans who were homeless prior to getting into the program.

- Additionally, in partnership with local non-profit organizations, the Housing Division helped 26 homeless families successfully transition into stable housing through targeted housing assistance.
- Housing Division earned a final HUD score of 104%, achieving the prestigious High Performer Housing Authority designation for excellence in program delivery and management.



- Inventoried accessible parking in Downtown public parking areas to improve visibility on the digital public parking map.
- Created A Better BGKY Inc., 501(c)(3) nonprofit, whose mission is to make BG a better place; focusing on fundraising for Downtown & Parks programs.
- Organized third Duncan Hines Days resulting in 13,000+ attendees from 17+ states, an estimated \$2 M in economic impact.
- 194+ Downtown event days and at least 300,000 attendees of outdoor Downtown events annually.
- Hosted public art contest to wrap 16 downtown traffic signal cabinets with vibrant art using GM Foundation Place Making grant funds.
- \$4.38M in housing assistance was distributed to local landlords—supporting both the local housing market and economy.

PUBLIC SAFETY: MORE STAFF, BETTER EQUIPMENT

- BGFD entered a partnership with Help the Helpers, LLC to provide hypervigilance training to all Fire Department personnel in FY25.
- Approved the addition of a Fire Inspection Supervisor role in the BGFD Prevention Division to create greater oversight of fire code inspections, fire code compliance, and building plan reviews.
- 31 Members of the BGFD completed Rope Rescue Technician certification.
- In August of 2024, Truck 6 replaced a 2010 aerial truck and became the newest truck in the BGFD fleet. The highest reach on the bucket is 100 feet, and enhanced technology allows for better on-scene operations.
- The BGFD was awarded funding from the Community Development Block Grant from the Commonwealth of Kentucky for a live-burn facility.

- In FY2025, the BGFD graduated a recruit class of 15 firefighter.
- The BGFD unveiled the Bob Sanborn Drill Tower to honor the career and decades of service of retired Captain Bob Sanborn.
- In FY25, nine members of the BGFD were promoted including three captains, five engineers, and one civilian Fire Inspection Supervisor.
- BGFD improved the safety of fire ground operations by increasing compliance with NFPA 1710 and increasing minimum staffing by 2 personnel. Total minimum staffing per day is now 40.
- Thanks to a generous donation, the BGFD opened the third Safe Haven Baby Box at Station 6 on Cherry Farm Lane. Safe Haven Baby Boxes are also located at Station 7 on Lovers Lane and Station 8 on Glasgow Road.



- Dark fiber was installed by the Information Technology Department and a backup link to complete a redundant loop for dispatch operations at the secondary disaster recovery 911 communication center.
- The BGFD Patrol Division utilized the Kentucky Office of Highway Safety grant funding to resume driver safety checkpoints within the City.

- To engage youth involvement, Public Information Division created Parks & Recreation and Public Works coloring and activity books for children.
- Public Information Division created educational videos for roundabouts, BikeWalkBG, Bowling Green Law Enforcement Academy graduations, golf tournaments, adaptive recreation, and other events.

EFFICIENT GOVERNANCE

- Bowling Green Parks & Recreation began using four autonomous mowers, one at Hobson Grove Golf Course and three at Russell Sims Aquatic Center.
- The main construction phase was completed for the Public Safety Training Center Facility with initial move-in beginning June 2025. This is a collaborative, multi-year project for the City that will meet the needs of the department through a dedicated location for in-service training, the Bowling Green Law Enforcement Academy (BGLEA) students and staff, the Communications disaster recovery site, and the BGFD training program and firefighter recruit academy.

• The Evidence Unit within the BGPD Logistics Division completed the annual evidence analysis during FY25 for the 2024 calendar year. This process provided helpful information to establish budget, review storage capacity, and establish disposition objectives and potential staffing needs. The FY25 analysis ended with a total inventory of 45,828 items which is a 5.57% decrease from FY24.

BETTER WAYS OF WORKING

- Completed numerous hardware, server and software application upgrades to take full advantage of new features and reduce the risk of security threats.
- Started conversion process of web pages and existing forms to meet Web Content Accessibility Guidelines.
- Implemented a centralized management system for digital displays.
- Went live with ePermit a product that allows contractors to apply and pay for electrical permits online.
- Helped set up a point of sales system so the public can make credit card purchases at the GoBG Transit location.

BETTER SECURITY AND SAFETY

 The IT Department conducted phishing tests on all City email accounts and provided monthly cybersecurity tips to keep employees vigilant to possible threats.

- The City's IT Department started segmenting the overall network into multiple virtual local area networks (VLAN) to reduce the impact of a cybersecurity attack.
- The IT Department held several cybersecurity tabletop exercises and disaster recovery scenario testing sessions to be better prepared when disaster strikes.
- City IT staff upgraded two existing Firewalls to new hardware to better protect the public safety network and to reduce ongoing support costs.
- To reduce cybersecurity threats, the IT Department updated firewall and DNS web filtering tools with blacklists from multiple agencies on a weekly basis.

- Configured and installed 23 grant funded network switches to improve performance and enhance security.
- Started the implementation and end user training of a grant funded password management system. This solution will improve the City's overall password hygiene by providing employees with encrypted storage, compromise monitoring and a strong, unique password generator.
- Audited the user permissions of all payroll and financial related software to verify segregation of duties and reduce the risk of fraudulent actions.



AWARDS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Fire Department saved a life on Media Drive; on September 3, 2024, the Fire Department was dispatched to a structure fire on Media Drive. Truck 4 initiated a search of the residence and quickly located and removed one victim, saving his life.
- An IT staff member gained a security related technical certification from the Computing Technology Industry Association.
- Awarded \$165,500 from the Kentucky
 Office of Homeland Security and the State
 and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program.

- Over \$2.1 million in personnel and non-personnel under spending was captured during FY2025 through disciplined fiscal management of the budget, which will be applied to future capital projects and other needs
- \$98,985.89 was collected from five online public auctions of surplus and confiscated items through GovDeals.com
- The pool of potential bidders for City projects is 1,459 subscribers to ensure competition and to achieve the best price and value for purchases greater than \$40,000. The IT Department archived inactive subscribers in FY2025 to clean up the database.

- At the annual Kentucky Association of Fire Chiefs leadership conference, Fire Chief Justin Brooks was awarded the 2024 Chief of the Year for the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
- City of Bowling Green Public Works took home four awards at the 2024 American Public Works Association Kentucky State Conference. These awards included Outstanding Supervisor of the Year, Roadway Project of the Year, Environmental Project of the Year, and Streetscape Project of the Year.
- The BGPD Community Engagement Team participated in more than 385 community events during FY25, providing outreach, education, and support to schools, local organizations, and business groups.
- Awarded the Governmental Finance Officers Association's (GFOA) Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting for the FY2024 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) for the nineteenth consecutive year
- The FY2024 Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) received the GFOA Outstanding Achievement Award for the fourteenth consecutive year
- The City's FY2025 budget document received the GFOA Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the thirteenth consecutive year
- The City received its sixth GFOA's Triple Crown designation for achieving Certificates of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting, Popular Annual Financial Reporting, and the Distinguished Budget Presentation

KEY BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

- Compared to last year's adopted budget, revenues in FY2026 are projected to increase by 8.7% for All Funds and increase by 8.9% for General Fund.
- The City's FY2026 operating budget, excluding capital projects, reflects an increase of 12.3% (\$17.8M) for All Funds and 12.4% (\$11.2M) for General Fund compared to FY2025. FY2026 marks the first year that facility maintenance and repairs were removed from the CIP.
- The General Fund operating budget includes a cost of living adjustment and merit increase for employees, adds 22 new full-time positions, a net decrease of one part-time position, and seven job reclassifications and/or upgrades impacting 35 positions.

- The total adopted Capital Improvement Program (CIP), including debt, is approximately \$31.9M, which is a 10.8% decrease compared to the FY2025 program approved with the adopted budget, and is the tenth year since FY2008 in which new capital projects represent over 50% of the total CIP budget.
- The FY2026 budget continues \$467,500 of special funding for workforce development programs through the Bowling Green Area Chamber of Commerce, South Central Kentucky Workforce Development Board, Goodwill, Hope House Ministries, WKU and Warren County to generate the creation and retention of new jobs, and continues to cover 100% of the fifth year of the Kentucky Transpark expansion bonds.
- Nearly \$4.2M of local tax dollars will be used to continue to pay the annual ballpark debt obligation and to distribute incremental growth from the Downtown Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District to support new development in the downtown corridor.
- \$760,000 of CDBG and local tax dollars will be used for the twelfth year of the BG Reinvestment Area to make neighborhood improvements within a defined target area. Also, \$60,000 of local tax dollars is once again allocated for the neighborhood grant program.

- Over \$6.97M in State and local funds will be used to maintain streets and sidewalks as part of the City's annual overlay and reconstruction program, build sidewalks and greenways, rehab Commerce Street, construct the Tomblinson Way roundabout, mitigate stormwater issues, and rehabilitate storm sewer infrastructure.
- Almost \$5.8M will be dedicated to enhancing public safety services with upgraded facilities, vehicles and equipment for both Police and Fire.
- Over \$9M in local tax revenues will be used to upgrade Parks and Recreation facilities and equipment, such as new playgrounds at Lovers Lane Soccer Complex and Roland Bland Park, continuing improvements at Pedigo and Lampkin parks, constructing a new Pro Shop and Cart Barn at Paul Walker Golf Course, converting two more soccer fields to turf, and investing in Phase 4 of Riverfront Park development.
