We are the local enforcement office that you can call, walk-in or email a complaint in the areas of Employment, Housing and Public Accommodation due to discrimination only. The initial complaints can be filed in our office.

- You have 180 days to file a complaint in employment and public accommodation and 100 days to file in housing.
- Once you have filed a complaint Kentucky Commission on Human Rights will send you paperwork to get notarized and mail back in 10 days.
- Next you will receive paperwork offering the opportunity for mediation between the respondent and complainant (either party can opt not to mediate).
- If there's no reconciliation met during mediation, the KCHR will move on to investigation.
- The investigators are called fact finders they are trying to prove probable cause of discrimination.
- ♦ The complaint process can be lengthy.

List of issues that the BG Human Rights Commission Don't Do!

Rent Increases Court Evictions

Maintenances calls Tenants charged for repairs

Ceilings peeling & cracking particles falling on floor and furniture

Landlord refusing rent payments

Tenants bedbugs, roaches, mice, and rats etc.

Rent deposits will have to be granted through small claims court

Property being sold tenant doesn't know the new owners

Landlord refusing to rent to a tenant other than discrimination

Landlord want repair or replace stove/refrigerator

Landlord will not supply heating/air conditioning

Landlord will not give a tenant a reference to move into another dwelling

Leaks and mold growing

Toilets want flush sewerage coming up into the house /apartment

If our agency isn't able to assist you in a crisis we have a number of agencies/organizations that we make referrals to.
