



During heavy rains from 15-16 February, road access to Brookwood Mobile Home Park was cut off due to 12 feet of water. Public Works initiated an emergency access road, completed in just 22 hours by a contract vendor. Public Works crews installed the final permanent bollards the **first week of March**. The roadway remains for vehicle emergency use only. It is open for walking.

Staff Highlights Tyler Phelps, LSIT was promoted to Surveyor I after passing his Fundamentals of Surveying exam. Tyler's in-house survey efforts will be critical in completing the design of capital improvement projects in a timely fashion and therefore moving those projects to construction.

Daniel Colter received the inaugural Public Works People's Choice Award. Nominated by his peers, Daniel's commitment to the overall success of our team, our department, and the City is second to none.

<u>Cave Mill Road Corridor Project</u> KYTC District 3 right-of-way staff completed a preliminary property acquisition estimate this month based on our design plans and will be taking this to leadership in Frankfort in hopes of getting the highway funds authorized. Once authorized, the City can move forward with selecting a property acquisition firm to begin the acquisition process.

<u>New Sidewalks</u> Program Staff received overwhelming support from our recent survey for the proposed sidewalk on Ridgecrest Way from Rodes Drive to Smallhouse Road. This project will be completed with in-house survey and design. Construction is anticipated late summer/early fall.

<u>Development Inspections</u> The new Public Works Construction Inspection Checklist was finalized and put into practice this month to help standardize site inspections by the Construction Coordinators. The development team has been collaborating with the Building Division at NCS to improve and unify our inspection efforts on permit inspections. Warranty Inspection Letters were sent out for Charlie Court, Logistics Court and Traditions Section 2, Phase 3.

<u>Greenway/Multi-Use Path Initiatives</u> Staff has finished the initial review of the Scottsville Road Multi-Use Path design, which is planned from Campbell Lane to Three Springs Road. Design should be wrapped up this summer with property acquisition to follow.

The second phase of the West End Greenway initiative will begin in April pending award. The multiuse path recently completed along Gordon Avenue will continue along Double Springs Road to Church Street and ultimately tie to the existing greenway on Kinklock Lane.

<u>Transportation Planning</u> City Engineers participated in various planning meetings in March. The first of several steps in developing the next State Highway Plan (SHIFT 2026 process) involved identifying the top transportation priorities for our MPO among a list of 100+ projects. The MPO is able to sponsor 9 projects which will be included with KYTC sponsored projects and recommended to Frankfort later this year.

<u>Greenway Sponsorship</u> In coordination with MPO's BikeWalkBG, civic organizations, citizen or businesses can sponsor sections of the city's greenway. Sponsors help insure maintenance needs are conveyed to Public Works. The following sponsors have been approved for 2025. When complete, this 2-lane, narrow roadway will be replaced with a 3-lane, curb and gutter corridor that will provide another primary access to the Kentucky Trimodal Transpark.






