


The operations crews repaired the alley between **E 7th Avenue** and **E 8th Avenue** in anticipation of the BG 26.2 Marathon. This repair necessitated a specialized approach, incorporating a new overlay while maintaining an angled slope to facilitate the proper drainage of stormwater into the designated stormwater infrastructure. **Greenhill Street Extension** - KYTC began review of the plans for the proposed traffic signal at the proposed new intersection with Greenhill Street and Veterans Memorial Lane; the hydraulic study continues which will provide updated data to FEMA to determine final design parameters for the portion of the roadway at the Jennings Creek crossing.


**Scottsville Road Multi-Use Path** - Design is complete for the 8' multi-use path from Campbell Lane to Three Springs Road. Right-of-way funds were accepted this month to initiate the property acquisition phase of the project.

**Old Morgantown Road Pedestrian Crossing** - In response to community concerns and the high number of students walking to The Learning Center on Old Morgantown Road, key safety improvements were made with safety of students and families in mind.

School zone flashers were installed to lower speeds from 25 mph to 15 mph during arrival and dismissal times, reminding drivers to slow down and stay alert when children are present. A set of double-sided Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) was also added at the midblock crossing near the school. These pedestrian-activated lights make students more visible and encourage drivers to stop at the crosswalk.



The **BG Reinvestment Area (BGRA)** received approval from HUD as a Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Area (NRSA). This area is outlined below. The NRSA designation provides flexibility within the federal regulations to carry out HUD funded activities. A requirement of the NRSA designation approval is to track other city investments in the BGRA. The map below summarized work completed in FY25. **Total investment = \$2,007,305**





- A purchase order was approved for the upfitting of a 2026 Ram Promaster from Mavron Inc, amounting to \$47,065.80 for Animal Control purposes. This cost encompasses the installation of nine cages, flooring, lighting, an HVAC system, a narcotics safe, and additional exterior lighting. (Approved on **21 October**)
- A purchase justification was approved for the upfitting of Unit 3392, Dodge Durango Police Pursuit vehicle, to install canine equipment in the amount of \$17,530.08. This unit replaces Unit 3298 (Approved on 22 October).
- The approved FY26 budget included the purchase of one Freightliner 114SD Plus with 14-foot Dump Bed, Plow, Salter and Stand. The unit purchase and upfitting cost of \$255,560 was approved on 24 October.
- The approved FY26 budget included the purchase of one F-750 with 10' Dump Bed, Plow, Salter and Stand. The unit purchase and upfitting cost of \$192,920.70 was approved on **27 October**.






